## DAVID G. BALDWIN

**Former Postmaster of New Orleans and Ex-Banker Dies in El Paso.**

### WELL KNOWN TO MANY EL PASOANS

David G. Baldwin, founder of the Baldwin sanitarium in El Paso, and banker and former postmaster of New Orleans, died early Friday morning at his residence, 1811 Rampert street, Golden Hill. He came here for his health in 1902, but has only been seriously ill since the first of this year.

Interested in the care of those suffering from tuberculosis, from which he suffered, Mr. Baldwin, after his arrival in El Paso, established the local sanitarium. He named the institution after his father, Albert Baldwin, a New Orleans capitalist and banker, who died about a month ago.

Before coming here Mr. Baldwin was prominent in New Orleans banking and political circles. He served 17 years as assistant cashier of the New Orleans National bank. He was made postmaster under president McKinley and the president expressed an unusual interest owing to Baldwin's recommendations from prominent men of various political parties. He resigned in 1902, owing to ill health.

Surviving are a widow, three sons and a daughter, Cuthbert, David G. Baldwin, jr., Lawrence, and Miss Mathilde Baldwin. Also, there are three brothers and one sister, residents of New Orleans. G. B. Baldwin, a brother; Mrs. Alice Vairin, a sister, and Cuthbert Baldwin, who is attending school in New Orleans, will arrive here Saturday night to attend the funeral. Services will be held Monday at the Church of St. Clement.

David G. Baldwin was born November 28, 1868, at New Orleans.

Baldwin was a member of the Elks, and the Elks will hold the services at the grave.

Deceased was one of the principal owners of the West Tularosa townsite, at Tularosa, N. M.
