22 Pupils Here OfferBlood, But Instructor Dies

Death Takes Dean Of Women At College Of Mines After Operation.

Efforts Are Futile

Football Player Accepted For Transfusion To Help Miss Beynon.

Death last night ended a valiant fight of physicians and more than a score of College of Mines and Arts students to save the life of Miss Abi Elizabeth Beynon. 35, dean of women and associate professor of business administration at the college, who had been critically fill at Masonic hospital for four days. She died at 9:45 o'clock.

Twenty-two students, many of whom had been students in Miss Beynon's classes for one or more years, yesterday offered their blood to strengthen the ebbing life of the popular instructor. The blood of one, Albert Williams, member of the Mines football squad, was accepted and a transfusion performed yes-terday afternoon.

Await Call.

The 21 other students early last night remained at places where they could be located quickly in the event another transfusion was deemed necessary.

Miss Beynon's death followed an operation performed eight days ago. Since Tuesday little hope for her recovery was held by her attending physicians.

Miss Beynon had been connected with El Paso school systems for seven years. Prior to her connection with the College of Mines and Arts she was head of the commercial department of El Paso high school. She had been a member of the college faculty since 1927. Her home was at 1923 East River street.

Mother at Bedside.

Her mother, Mrs. E. A. Beynon,
Lincoln, Neb., was at her bedside
when she died. A brother, who is
a Lincoln attorney, is expected to
arrive today.
