

Death of Dr. Bingham.

Dr. H. L. Bingham died at his home on El Paso street early yesterday morning of consumption. Dr. Bingham's death removes a man who was as well known as any resident of the city and who was universally held in high regard as a man of high purpose and of warm sympathy with every good work. His widow is not alone in her sorrow for the good man who has gone.

Henry Lyman Bingham was born in Sunbury, Delaware county, Ohio, on the 7th day of February, 1835, and was therefore 53 years old at his death. He came to Texas fourteen years ago from Kalamazoo, Michigan. He resided in San Antonio about seven years. He left San Antonio for Mexico on account of his health, and from Mexico he came to El Paso, where he has lived for the past five years. He was the first W. M. of Anchor Lodge A. F. and A. M. of San Antonio. At the time of his death he was the W. M. of El Paso Lodge 130, A. F. and A. M. He was also a member of Milam Lodge A. O. U. W., of San Antonio; also a charter member of Emmett Crawford Post No. 19, G. A. R. of this city and one of its principal officers. As a union soldier in the late war he served in the Fifteenth Ohio infantry, Co. D, and in Co. I, Third Ohio cavalry. He was discharged on a surgeon's certificate of disability.

The funeral services will take place at 10 o'clock this morning at the Episcopal church. The remains will be buried with Masonic and Grand Army honors, as appears from notices to the members of those organizations, elsewhere in this issue of the **TIMES**.
