Alfred Rust Burges, 53, well-known El Paso attorney, died suddenly at 2:15 o'clock yesterday afternoon of heart disease. Don'th came to him in the office of Dr. P. D. Garrett in the Two Republies building, where he had gone for medicine to relieve the suffering he was undergoing. Before Dr. Garrett could comply with the request Mr. Burges was dead. Maj. Lifebard F. Burges, a brother, with which the deceased had been associated in the practice of law for a number of years telephoned to W. H. Burges, anoth brother, to come to the Two Republics building as rapidly as he could as Rust Burges was very iii. W. H. Burges law offices are in the First National band building. He hurried over to the Two Republics, but when he reached there his brother was dead.

"No.," replied Mr. Burges, "that will not he necessary. You take the suito key up to my office and leave it on my desk." With that he went in the building and entered the elevator.

Mr. Perrenot took the automot, ekey up to the law offices of Burges & Burges and left it on Rust Burges, was seriously ill.

Dies Before Getting Medicine. Mr. Burges entered Dr. Garrett's of-fice, complained of suffering with in-digestion and asked for some medi-cine. Before the doctor could give it

Mr. Burges was admitted to the practice of, law about 1894. He took and manach the bar examination at San Angeio and continued in the practice of law mith 1917, the year he came to El Paso. On arriving here he formed at law partnership with Major Eurges un this partnership continued until the time of his death.

With the exception of the latter, which came up more or less recently, Rust Burges attended to all the details connected with the law business of the other concerns while Major Burges was in the army and in France during the World war. Rust Burges was regarded by leading attor-neys as an excellent lawyer,

Attends to \$700,000 Bond Issue.

The last legal business he was tending to, prior to his death, was that connected with the issuance of \$700,000 worth of bonds for the recently organ-ized water improvement district in Hudspeth county. The issue was mainly for the purpose of putting in irrigation

the purpose of putting in irrigation disches in the section embraced.

Hust Burges was a captain during the Spanish-American. War. At the Outbreak of the war, when the country was calling for volunteers, he enlisted. He was in San Angelo at the time and raised a company of men. Former Schafor C. A. Culberson, then governof of the state, appointed him a captain. As commanding officer of Company F. Fourth Texas infantry, Captain Burges went to Houston with his men to be mustered into service: He was later sent to San Antonio, where he was startioned. Much to his chagrin, he was never able to get out of the state and into the actual conflict. After he was into the actual conflict. After ha was mustered out of the service, Capinin Burgos returned to San Angelo and remained there until January, 1912, when he came to El Paso.

Here ha lived with his prother, W.IL.

Burges, until December 20, 1914, when he was married to Miss Leona Stanley of Austin, Texas, but who had been liv-ing here. Mr. and Mrs. Burges resided in the city until 1920, when they moved to their valley home, where they lived for some time. After this they returned to the city. The present home is at 3501 Louisville street.

Mr. Burges was a member of the county and state bar associations. He bare an enviable reputation among those

bore an envinible reputation among those in the legal fraternity, as well as in the ranks of those in other walks of life.

He is survived here by his wife and two brothers, W. H. and Maj. B. F. Burges. The body is at Peak-Hagedon's. Funeral arrangements probably will be completed today. Miss Gray Stanley of Dallas, a sister of Mrs. A. R. Burges, is expected here to attend the funeral.
