For seven years in El Paso, he worked as machinist for the old Galveston, Hattiesburg and San Antonio railroad, now the Texas and New Orleans.

He bought a farm in Ysieta, and traveled to work in El Paso each day, driving a horse and spring wagon over the old Spanish Trail
