

J. CALISHER, PIONEER, TO BE BURIED TODAY

Funeral services for Jacob Calisher, aged 74, who died Thursday at his residence, 1217 North Oregon street, will be held this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock at the Peak-Hagedon chapel. Burial will be in Concordia cemetery. Rabbi Martin Zigelonka will conduct the services.

Mr. Calisher was born in Konmte, Prussia, December 7, 1848, and came to El Paso in 1881. From that time until he retired from active business, in 1914, he was a leader in the city's commercial life. When he came to the city, he opened the California store, now the location of the International cafe. He occupied the old building on the site of the Elite confectionary. The old structure, destroyed by fire, was erected by the late J. M. Buckler for Mr. Calisher.

In 1911, he built for himself the structure now known as the Reynolds building, occupied by the Border National bank, at Stanton and Texas street, and engaged in the dry goods business there until the time of his retirement. This store was known as Everybody's.

He is survived by one son, Lawrence; a daughter, Mrs. Max Moye, and his widow, Mrs. Ada F. Calisher, all of El Paso; and a sister, Mrs. S. Tolvok, of Los Angeles.
