

McGinty Band Founder Dies

Trinidad Concha, 'Musical Cobbler' Succumbs At Home In El Paso.

Trinidad Concha, 71, retired, noted for being an organizer of the famous McGinty band in 1900, died at his home, 621 South Virginia street, early yesterday.

Affectionately called the "musical cobbler," he was associated with the Charles Rokahr company in manufacture of shoes, and in his leisure time was conductor, leader, composer and teacher of music.

He came to El Paso in 1887 with the Mexican National orchestra, and stayed to rear a family which now includes 18 grand children and six great grand children.

Funeral services will be at 8 a. m. tomorrow at San Ignatius church, Father Blanchard officiating. Burial will be in Evergreen cemetery under direction of Kaster and Maxon.

Survivors are: three brothers, Jesus, Seferino, Merced, two sisters, Esther, Otila; four sons, Rafael, David, Carlos, Ramon; four daughters, Esther Barrios, Sarah Vasquez; Concepcion Arriola, Laredo; and Maria Louisa Concha.
