

FOURTH VICTIM OF AUTO WRECK

**George Crichett, El Paso
Printer, Dies at Deming;
Lived at Ysleta.**

Deming, N. M., Feb. 4.--A fourth name was added to the list of fatalities resulting from the crossing tragedy which occurred here last Thursday when George Crichett, died at the local hospital of internal injuries received when a Santa Fe switch engine struck the automobile Crichett was driving and demolished it, killing the three daughters of editor E. R. Vallandigham, seriously injuring editor Vallandigham and fatally injuring Crichett.

It was believed that Crichett, who was a linotype operator in the printing plant of the Deming Headlight, would recover from his injuries but internal hemorrhages developed and his death followed. Before coming here Crichett worked on the Silver City Enterprise and was also employed in various printing shops in El Paso.

George Crichett was a brother of Cecil Crichett, the county moton. policeman on the Ysleta road, who lives at Ysleta. With his wife he has gone to Deming to attend the funeral of his brother. George Crichett lived in Ysleta before coming to El Paso and his father, G. C. Crichett, lived at Ysleta with his sons. He is now teaching school in Arkansas.
