

**Death of P. J. Crosbie.**

The following telegram was received yesterday from General Freight Agent Finley, of the Texas & Pacific.

DALLAS, Nov. 5.

D. R. Williams, El Paso:—With deep regret I announce the death this morning from typhoid fever, of P. J. Crosbie who served us well in El Paso territory.

It has been known here for a week past that Mr. Crosbie was at the verge of death, but his friends still hoped for better news. He left El Paso about the middle of August to accept promotion to a position in the general freight office of the Texas and Pacific at Dallas.

For a young man not far in the twenties, Mr. Crosbie had had quite a remarkable career, and gave promise of a brilliant future. He was from Central New York. His people live at Auburn, New York, and his brother is chief of police of that city. When a mere lad he filled responsible positions in various telegraph offices in the east, and was afterwards sent to Central America by the Pacific mail company. He came to El Paso several years ago, being located at different times at Deming, at the City of Mexico, and with the Corralitos company. As agent for the Texas & Pacific railroad in this city, his work was such as to win the regard of all who knew him here, and to secure warm recognition from the railroad company. His death cuts short a bright career.
