With the announcement of the death of former mayor Davis, the bell at the Central fire etation was tolled 60 times, the deceased having passed the 60th mark at the city half, court house, central fire station, Elies' home and on the flag pole in San Jacinto plaza. Several private flags are also at half mast.

The captain died from meningitis. which seized him several days ago, and there had been no hope for his recovery

for some time past.
Captain Davis was in his fist year, having been born in Eldorado, Arkansas, in Sept. 18, 1847, and had lived a usein Sept, 18, 1847, and had lived a useful and honorable career, and had held many public offices. Until a few years ago, when he retired from active practice, he was known as one of the most brilliant lawyers of west Texas. He owned considerable property in El Paso and was past grand commander of the Knights Templar of Texas, which order has charge of the functal services. He was also an Elk and a member of sevwas also an Elk and a member of several fraternal orders besides his Mason. te connections.
