

L. A. FOIX, 57, PIONEER OF YSLETA, DIES

L. A. Foix, pioneer resident of Ysleta, died at his home there Thursday morning of heart disease.

Mr. Foix was 57 years old. He came to the United States from France, his native country, in 1882, landing in New York. He later went to Los Angeles and came to El Paso in 1887.

About six months after his arrival he became head of the International college in Juarez, a position which he held for four years. This is now the Escobar Brothers' Agricultural college. He then returned to a ranch which he had bought a mile north of Ysleta.

About ten years ago he bought a confectionery store from W. J. Harris, which he sold recently to J. W. Riordan. Three months ago he bought the Grecian confectionery at 217 South El Paso street.

Mr. Foix was justice of the peace in his precinct for 12 years. In 1914 he was elected a trustee of the school board, holding this office for two terms. His first wife died 25 years ago and in 1899 he was married to Miss Emma Loewenstein, sister of Joseph, Isaac and Louis Loewenstein of Ysleta.

Surviving are his widow, a son, Louis M. Foix, and a brother, Aubin Foix, of Los Angeles. Mr. Foix was a member of the Woodmen of the World.

The body is at the Simmons-Hartford chapel. Funeral arrangements are delayed pending word from Mr. Foix's brother in Los Angeles.
