

# DEATH TAKES EUGENE FOX

## Cerebral Hemorrhage Fatal to El Paso Railroad Man In Kansas City

Eugene Fox, 54, 1119 Montana St., former vice president of the El Paso and Southwestern railroad, died today in a Kansas City, Mo., hospital.

Mr. Fox became ill while en route from St. Louis to Kansas City. A cerebral hemorrhage caused death.

Mr. Fox was born in Winterset, Iowa, in 1877. He began his railroad career in 1895 as a yard clerk for the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific railroad.

### Made Traffic Manager

He came to El Paso as assistant general freight agent of the E. P. & S. W. in 1909. At the time of the merger of the E. P. & S. W. and the Southern Pacific lines Mr. Fox was vice president in charge of traffic.

After the merger, he was made freight traffic manager.

He left the Southern Pacific lines in 1926 to accept a position as traffic manager with the Western Pacific railroad. His headquarters were in San Francisco, Calif.

### Maintained El Paso Home

Mr. Fox left the Western Pacific in 1927 to become general freight agent for the Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroad. He was employed by the M. K. & T. at the time of his death.

Though Mr. Fox's headquarters were in St. Louis, he maintained a home in El Paso, where Mrs. Fox has been living.

Funeral arrangements are pending in Kansas City. Local railroad officials said the body either will be buried in the family plot in Iowa, or will be brought to El Paso for burial.
