

MRS. JEANNE TYE S. GEMMERS.

Mrs. Jeannette Gemmer, pioneer El Pasoan, who for many years conducted the Bell Telephone Exchange, died at the home of her daughter Mrs. Chas. A. Krause, 1115 Olive street, at 6 o'clock Saturday morning. Funeral arrangements have not been perfected, but interment will be private, and she had made a request prior to her death that no flowers be sent.

Born in the city of Montclair, Belgium, on April 12, 1850, Mrs. Gemmers came to the United States in 1883, and three years later came to El Paso to make her home. She had resided here up to the time of her death.

Surviving her are four sons, Emil R., Leon L., Ernest R. and Joseph E. and three daughters, Mrs. J. D. Ponder, Mrs. Chas. A. Krause and Mrs. H. M. Napier of El Paso, and Mrs. O. H. Andrews of Long Beach, Calif., and sister Mary Adeline, of the Sisters of St. Theodosia, founded at Santa Fe, N. M. The two latter will arrive in El Paso Sunday, the other children all being here at the time of her death.
