

Funeral For Colonel Glasgow Will Be Held Here Tuesday

Requiem mass will be held at 10 a. m. Tuesday in Immaculate Conception Church for Col. William Jefferson Glasgow, Jr. followed by burial with military honors in Evergreen Cemetery. Rosary services will be held at 8:30 p. m. Sunday in the Hagedorn-Harding Chapel.

Colonel Glasgow, a member of General MacArthur's headquarters since July 4, 1945, died suddenly on Nov. 14, 1947.

Prior to his services in the Far East, he joined the Planning Section of the Army General Staff in Washington in 1942 and in February, 1943 was sent to North Africa. Colonel Glasgow served there and in Sicily, and Italy. For his services he was made an officer of the "Order of the British Empire." He received also the Order of the Crown of Italy. For services in the Mediterranean Campaign, he received the Legion of Merit and another Legion of Merit for his work in the Far East.

Colonel Glasgow was born at Governors Island, N. Y., on Sept. 6, 1905 and was graduated from the United States Military Academy at West Point in 1927 where he later served as instructor. He served with the United States Forces in China and, in 1945, he was graduated from the U. S. Naval War College.

He is survived by his wife, Corina Sheridan, only granddaughter of Gen. Philip Sheridan of Civil War fame and great-granddaughter of Saml. Hart of Hart's Mill, El

Paso, and by his six-year old daughter, Isabel.

He is survived also by his parents, Gen. and Mrs. William J.

Glasgow of El Paso; by two brothers, Col. Joseph M. Glasgow, Eighth Army, Yokohama, Japan, and Edward J. Glasgow of Nashville, Tenn.; and by his sister, Octavia M. Glasgow, of El Paso.

A member of a pioneer Texas family, he was the grandson of Joseph Magoffin one of the three incorporators of this city in 1873. He was the great-grandson of James Wiley Magoffin, founder of Magoffinsville—now El Paso.
