SAMUEL L. GOODMAN DIES IN LOS ANGELES

Body of El Paso Merchant to Be Brought Here For Burial.

Samuel L. Goodman, a pioneer merchant of El Paso, died Friday night in Los Angeles, Cal. He had been an invalid for about two years, and for six years had lived in the California city, where a daughter and a son reside. A month ago Mr. Goodman returned here, but his failing health required him to go back to the coast.

Samuel L. Goodman was born in 1848 in Hungary. He came to the United States 30 years ago, soon locating in El Paso. Twenty-five years ago he established here a small store, which slowly grew into what is now the Goodman Produce company, a wholesale firm. At first he engaged in importing oranges, later turning his attention to the general produce business.

Retiring from the business, in which he was affiliated with D. Miller, his soninlaw, Mr. Goodman went to Los Angeles to join his daughter. Mrs. H. Schreiver, with whom he resided, and his son, Harry B. Goodman, of Los Angeles. Mrs. D. Miller was with her father at the time of his death. He is also survived by a brother, Louis Goodman, of Mexico City. Samuel Goodman's wife died seven years ago.

The body will be brought to El Paso for funeral services and interment. Services will be held Monday morning at 9:30 at the chapel, 110 North Campbell street. Rabbi Martin Zielonka, of Temple Mt. Sinai, of which congregation Mr. Goodman was an active member, will officiate at the services.
