

## **MISS MARY D. GREEN DIES SUNDAY EVENING**

Miss Mary D. Green died Sunday evening after a brief illness. Suffering from bronchitis, Miss Green's heart could not stand the shock of illness, and her death resulted from heart failure.

As "Miss Mary," Miss Green was known to hundreds of young men and women in El Paso who had boarded with her at her private boarding house. She had been a resident of El Paso for the past 18 years and during the greater part of that time she kept a private boarding house where many of the best known men in El Paso boarded. At one time she had her boarding house at the Summit place on Missouri street, later removed to the Tobin house on Franklin and El Paso streets, and then to 908 North Oregon street, where she was living at the time of her death. During these years she had a crowd of congenial young people boarding and rooming at her house and it was like a big family with "Miss Mary" as the head. Van Wilson, Dr. D. H. Huffaker, Dr. Hugh S. White, Van Baker, and other well known El Paso men were boarders with Miss Green as bachelors. Of the old crowd who boarded with her, several have died within recent years. This list includes Walter Hunter, Devine Smith and Carl Strosier.

Miss Green was a native of Lawson, Mo., where her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Reeves Gant, are still living. She had planned to return to her home in Missouri for a visit several times, but was prevented from going by illness. She also has a sister living in Lawson. John N. Hughes, of El Paso, was her uncle. Miss Green was 52 years of age. The funeral will be arranged later.
