W. W. Harvey, 77, Resident Of City For 21 Years, Dies

After an illness of two weeks, W. W. Harvey, 77, resident of El Paso for 21 years, died this morning at 4

oclock at a local hospital,

Mr. Harvey was familiarly known as "colonel" to his friends. While his title was an honorary one, yet Mr. Harvey had a military record During the last year of the Civil war he ran away from his home in New York state and joined the Union army. He served as a strummer boy until the close of the war.

After the war, Mr. Harvey's family moved to Iowa, where the remainder of his young manhood was spent. Later he went to Chicago, where he married Miss Mary Elizabeth Smith in 1905. On account of his wife's health he moved to El Paso where he remained until the time of his death.

For the past seven years Col. Harvey lived at the Elks' club, of which organization he was a member of long standing. For two years he occupied a position in the 41st district court.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Owen P. White of El Paso; a sister, Mrs. Emma A. Shaw, Davenport, Ia., and two brothers, Thomas and Albert of Lawton, Okla., and Tampa, Fla., respectively.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Peak-Hagedon chapel at 11 oclock Saturday morning. The Elks will be in charge of the services there. The Rev. W. Angie Smith, pastor of Trinity Methodist church, will officiate at the grave. Burial will be in the Elks' plot in Evergreen cemetery.
