

W. C. HARVIE DIES FROM PNEUMONIA

Candidate for Alderman and Ironmaster Passes Away Saturday Night.

William C. Harvie, vice president of the Darbyshire-Harvie Foundry & Machine company and candidate for city alderman, died at 8 o'clock Saturday night at Providence hospital after suffering for one week from pneumonia.

He was stricken with pneumonia on January 10, and the next morning was removed to the hospital. The crisis was reached Saturday morning and it was then known that death was but a matter of hours. When the end finally came at 8 p. m. Saturday night, his brother, Crawford Harvie, was at his bedside.

The deceased was born in Liverpool, Eng., July 8, 1863, and was 51 years of age. When he was 11 years of age his parents moved to the United States, locating in Boston, Mass. Nine years later he left the home in Boston to try his fortune in the west. He went to Pueblo, Colo., where, until 1889, he was employed as a mechanic in the various smelters. In 1889 he came to El Paso to accept the position of master mechanic of the El Paso smelter.

Established Laundry Here.

Two years later he established, with his brother, James Harvie, the El Paso laundry. The venture was a success, but after four years, he turned the active management of the concern over to his brother and accepted a position with a smelting concern at Monterey, Mex. During the six years that followed he was connected with various smelters in Monterey, but some ten years ago returned to El Paso. He had previously become financially interested in the Pass City foundry and upon his return took over the management of the plant. A short time afterward a reorganization took place and the name was changed to the Darbyshire-Harvie Iron & Machine Co. Mr. Harvie continued in active charge of the plant and at the time of his death was vice president and manager. He was also associated with his brother, Crawford Harvie, in the El Paso laundry, the business that he established in 1891.

Was Unmarried.

Mr. Harvie never married and made his home at the Toltec club, of which he was a member and a director. He was also a Mason, being a member of El Paso consistory No. 3, Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, and of El Mataca temple, Ancient Arabic Order, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine.

Mr. Harvie nearly lost his life some 16 years ago, when he was severely scalded by the explosion of a boiler at the plant of the El Paso laundry.

The deceased is survived by three brothers, James Harvie of Vancouver, Wash.; John Harvie, of Chihuahua, Mex., and Crawford Harvie of this city, and by three sisters, Mrs. James Henderson, who came here about a year ago from Los Angeles, Calif., and Misses Helen, and Agnes E. Harvie of Boston, Mass.

The funeral will be held at 2 p. m. Tuesday from 506 Texas street and will be in charge of the Masons. A brief service will be conducted by Dr. John E. Abbott, pastor of Westminister Presbyterian church, and the interment will be in Evergreen cemetery. The following will act as pall bearers: Perseval Henderson, B. F. Darbyshire, George Flory, E. S. Stewart, W. W. Rose, Park Pitman, W. E. Lowe, M. C. Edwards, R. C. Walshe and Tom Holland.
