

## OLD CITIZEN DEAD

### Andrew Hornick, Who Had Lived Here Nearly Fifty Years, Expired Last Evening.

Andrew Hornick one of the oldest citizens of El Paso and a man who had led an exemplary life, died at 5:05 o'clock last evening at his residence corner Chihuahua and San Francisco streets.

Deceased had been ill for a long time with cancer of the stomach but his condition did not become serious until four days ago when he began to sink rapidly, expiring last evening surrounded by his sorrowing daughter grand children and friends.

Andrew Hornick had been a resident of El Paso since 1851. He was born in Bavaria and would have been 86 years old next July. He was a cabinet maker by trade and followed that business here until twenty-five years ago when he retired. He was a Mason and the oldest member of the fraternity residing in El Paso being the last charter member of El Paso Lodge No. 130 A. F. & A. M.

The funeral took place this afternoon at 3 o'clock and will be conducted by the Masons. The body is now at Ross' establishment being prepared for burial.

Mrs. Caroline Stine is an only daughter of deceased. Her children, Mrs. Julia Behr, wife of Louis Behr of the Water company, Ed Stine collector at Pomeroy's Transfer company barns, and several younger children, among whom are Master Rex and Miss Carrie, were great favorites with the grandfather and a great comfort to him in his old age.

During his residence of nearly half a century in El Paso. Andrew Hornick had been an industrious, law abiding citizen and a good neighbor and a wide circle of friends will mourn his loss. He leaves considerable property.

## DEATH OF A PIONEER.

One of the Settlers and the Oldest Mason in El Paso Died Sunday.

Andrew Hornick, the oldest Mason in El Paso and one of its pioneer settlers, died Sunday at 5:05 p m. at his residence at the corner of San Francisco and Chihabua streets.

Mr. Hornick was born in Bavaria in

July 1813 and hence would have been 86 years on his next birthday. He came to El Paso in 1851 when it was but a small frontier settlement and watched its growth to its present size and importance. He was a cabinet maker by trade but retired from active business about twenty-five years ago. He acquired considerable property and many friends during his residence in El Paso.

He leaves an only daughter Mrs. Caroline Steine and several grand children, among whom Mrs. Julia Behr, wife of Louis Behr, of the El Paso Water company, Edward Steine, now collector for Poineroy's Transfer company and several younger children.

His funeral took place yesterday under the auspices of the Masonic order and was largely attended.
