

A. J. Inderrieden, Prominent EP Mining Operator, Succumbs

Arthur Joseph Inderrieden, 65, prominent Southwest and California mining promotor and financier, died Tuesday afternoon in his home, 1631 East River Street, after a long illness.

Born in Chicago, Mr. Inderrieden first engaged in mining operations in Canada. He followed this with a business career in Chicago and New York City, where he was associated with many business men and financiers of world renown, among them Lord Beaverbrook, the Warner brothers and Bernard E. (Ben) Smith, famous Wall Street capitalist.

While in New York, Mr. Inderrieden engaged in the automobile business and for a number of years was chief timer at the Indianapolis Speedway, the automotive industry's spectacular proving grounds.

Mr. Inderrieden represented Mr. Smith in numerous mining ventures in the Southwest, California, Colorado, and Nevada.

Through the Warner brothers, inventors and manufacturers of the first electric speedometer, Mr. Inderrieden became general manager of the old 85 Mine at Lordsburg, N. M. From 1910 to 1924 he developed the mine into a property that sold for \$1,000,000 cash. During those years he was Lordsburg's leading citizen.

Retiring to El Paso, he became connected here with other capitalists in natural gas, principally the Fort Stockton Natural Gas Company. However, he continued some of his mining interests, chiefly with Mr. Smith in New Mexico and California.

Mr. Inderrieden is survived by his widow, Mrs. Cornelia Inderrieden, El Paso; two half brothers, Richard Travers, Hollywood, Calif., and Ellis Travers, New York City, and two half sisters, Mrs. Inez Boulton, Washington, D. C., and Miss Ann Travers, Chicago.

Funeral services will be held at 9 a. m. Thursday in Immaculate Conception Church with the Rev. Father F. J. Clarkson officiating. Burial will be in Evergreen Cemetery under the direction of Barry Hagedorn Funeral Home.
