

FRED KACHLER DIES MONDAY

Former Alderman Under Mayor Campbell Passes Away After Long Illness.

Fred Kachler, city alderman under mayor Robert F. Campbell, and a pioneer citizen of El Paso and the southwest, died suddenly at his home, 1000 Myrtle avenue at 8:15 Monday night after a long illness.

He was a native of Le Roy, N. Y., where he was born on June 4, 1850. He resided there until 1888, when he removed to Lake Valley, N. M., where he was employed by the Santa Fe railroad. He also lived in Deming, Silver City and other places in the southwest. He removed to El Paso in 1892 and was elected a member of the city council under mayor Campbell and also served as assistant postmaster under postmaster T. B. Oldhausen. For many years he was agent for the Fleischman & Co., selling yeast to El Paso housewives.

Mr. Kachler was a member of the Methodist church and is survived by his widow, his sister, Mrs. J. F. Kilburn, and four nephews and a niece. The nephews are H. E. Kilburn, James Kilburn, Dr. George Wells and Charles Kilburn, a cadet at West Point. The niece is Miss Katherine Kilburn.

The funeral will be held from McBean, Simmons & Hartford's chapel Wednesday at 2 p. m. and the burial will be in Concordia cemetery.

Out of respect to the memory of Mr. Kachler the flag on the city hall was ordered placed at half mast by mayor Tom Lea Tuesday morning.
