Linson Montgomery Keener, a resident of El Paso for 30 years, died last night at his residence, 3726 Clifton St. He was 93. Mr. Keener is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mattie E. Keener, El Paso.

Funeral services will be held at 11 a. m. at Peak-Hagedon Chapel with Rev. L. A. Boone and Rev. W. H. Hatchell officiating.

Burial will be in Restlawn Memorial Park.

Linson Montgomery Keener Death Leaves John C. Roseborough
Last Member Here of Southern Army in Civil War

The death of Linson Montgomery Keener, 93-year-old Confederate veteran, last night in his home, 3726 Clifton St., leaves one remaining Southern veteran in El Paso.

He is John C. Roseborough, native of Chester, S. C., who has lived in El Paso for 30 years. His daughter is Mrs. H. C. Dyer, 4109 Clifton St.

Mr. Roseborough came to Texas in 1890. He lived in San Angelo and Brownwood. He practiced law in St. Louis and Mississippi prior to that. He was graduated from Kentucky University and the Cumberland University Law School, Lebanon, Tenn.

Reward Offered

A member of Fort's Scouts of Mississippi, who harassed the "Yankees" continually, Mr. Roseborough went through the Civil War with a price of \$1000 on his head. The Northern forces offered that reward for capture of one of Fort's Scouts, Mrs. Dyer said today.

Mr. Roseborough is active today. He is keenly interested in politics and writes articles to the newspapers on controversial questions. He retired from the real estate business in El Paso 10 years ago, Mrs. Dyer said today. Mr. Roseborough is in California on a vacation.

Funeral services for Mr. Keener were held today at 11 a. m. in Peak Hagedorn Chapel with Rev. L. A. Boone and Rev. W. H. Hatchell officiating. Burial was in Restlawn Cemetery.

Mr. Keener was born in Union

Spring, Ala., in 1842 and came to Rusk County, Tex., with his parents in 1848. He has lived in El Paso since 1907.

He fought in the battles of Fort Donaldson, Fort Hudson, La. Raymond, Miss., and Chickamauga, Ga., where he was wounded for the second time. He was promoted to lieutenant. He was home on furlough granted by Gen. John B. Hood, when Lee surrendered to Grant.

Mr. Keener is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mattie Keener, and Mrs. Linnie M. Jordan, an adopted daughter.
