

DEATH OF JOHN C. KRAUSE.

Passing Away of an Estimable Young Man
Who Once Lived at El Paso.

The Washington Post of May 31, has the following relative to the death of John C. Krause:

"In the death of John Conrad Krause, which occurred in this city yesterday morning, another martyr to the strain and stress of the Spanish war passed away. Mr. Krause was a paymaster in the volunteer service of the army, and his strength was so taxed last summer and fall that he had an attack of nervous prostration in February. This obliged him to give up all work for the time being and to return to his home in New York City for rest. About a month ago he thought himself well enough to resume his tasks, and came to Washington to settle up his accounts. The exertion proved too much for him, however, and he died yesterday morning at the home of an intimate friend, Captain F. P. Gross, who lives at 1346 Yale street. His wife reached the city just before his death, having been summoned from Delaware Water Gap.

"Mr. Krause was born in Canton, Ohio, thirty-eight years ago, entering a bank at that place when a boy fourteen years of age. Subsequently he engaged in the banking business in El Paso, Texas, and Juarez, Mexico, removing to New York City a short time ago. The funeral will take place at the residence of Captain Gross at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, the interment to be at Arlington. The service will probably be conducted by Rev. George F. Dudley, rector of St. Stephen's Episcopal church."

John Krause lived in El Paso a number of years, and was book keeper in the First National bank. He was married here to Miss Porter, whose mother was then postmistress of El Paso. Mr. Krause had many friends in this city to mourn his death. He was a most capable and worthy young man of a bright, genial nature and companionable disposition. He was a prime favorite with all who knew him in this city.
