

Haymon Krupp Taken by Death At Age of 74

Haymon Krupp, El Paso businessman, died yesterday in a hospital at Rochester, Minn., after a two weeks' illness here. He had been in poor health for a year. He was 74.

Mr. Krupp came to the United States from Europe when a youth. He came to El Paso in 1890. He established a wholesale clothing house here which carried on extensive trade over the Southwest.

He branched out into various fields of business and made a fortune in oil in the Big Lake field. His gifts to charities were most generous.

Was "Best Citizen"

One of his most outstanding local aids to the poor was gift of coal during cold weather several years ago.

One of his early employes, a Juarez deliveryman, was Pancho Villa, who later became the Mexico Revolutionary leader.

Mr. Krupp was active in El Paso civic affairs. He was a director of the Chamber of Commerce for many years.

He was selected by the American Legion for the "Best Citizen" award in El Paso, in 1929.

He was a 32nd Degree Mason, Elk, member of the Knights of Pythias and the Knights of Maccabees.

Rites Are Pending

He married the former Leah Silverman, April, 1899. She died shortly after their 25th wedding anniversary. Mr. Krupp was married again in 1933 to the former Rebecca Goldstein. She survives.

Mr. Krupp reaves two daughters and a son by his former marriage. They are Mrs. Leland H. Hewitt of Seattle, Wash.; Mrs. James Stone of Brockton, Mass., and M. Bernard Krupp of El Paso. Two grandchildren and several nieces and nephews also survive. The family home is at 910 West Yandell boulevard.

The body is expected to arrive here Thursday, with funeral services to be held Sunday. Harding and Orr are in charge of arrangements.
