
Col. Nathan D. Lane, one of the pioneers of El Paso, died Friday after

neers of El Paso, died Friday afternoon at his home in the upper valley
near Canutillo.

Col. Lane was weather observer at
El Paso for many years, having come
here in 1891 and having served as
weather observer until his retirement. In 1916.

N. D. Lane was born March 7, 1851,
at Minot. Me, the sen of Mr. and Mrs.
B. F. Lane. He received his education
in Minot. When 18 he went to Portland. Me., to live, entering the Signal
corps of the United States army at the
age of 20, when the army was in need

of young men, particularly in the west. He received his training at Fort Meyer, near Washington, D. C. His first station was, at Augusta. Ga., for two years; then Port Huron, Mich., three years. Then for two years he left the government service to travel for the Stylographic Pen company, of Providence, R. I., a fountain pen concern in which he held an interest.

Helped Open the West.

The demand by the government for young men who, were expert operators to open up the west caused him to again enter the service, and after a time spent in Washington, D. C., he was sent to New Mexico, at a time when the Indians were on the warpath. He opened posts in Socorro, Mesilla, Silver City, N. M., and Prescott, Ariz. In 1854, on March 5, he married Miss Jennie Casad, of Mesilla, N. M. They moved to Prescott, Ariz. where he had charge of the signal station. From Prescott he was stationed in Washington, D. C., and when the signal corps and the weather bureau became two separate departments he chose his work with the weather bureau.

Came Here in 1891.

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For two years he was in charge of the station at Portland, Me., coming to take charge of the El Paso office in 1891. He held this post up to the time of his retirement on account of ill health, in June, 1916.

Col. Lane came of one T the oldest New England families, his branch of the Lane family coming from England early in the 17th century.

He leaves a widow, Jennie C. Lane, a daughter, Mrs. J. W. Lorentzen, president of the El Paso Woman's club; a son, Wallace C. Lane, and one brother, Charles M. Lane, of Mechanic Falls, Me. Falls, Me. Funeral Sunday.
