

SUDDEN DEATH OF MRS. HELEN BAYLOR LEE.

Word reached this city this morning of the sudden death of Mrs. Helen Baylor Lee, at Monterey, Mex., on May 25. Mrs. Lee was the wife of Sam Lee, who formerly resided in this city, where he had charge of the Grand Central hotel, but who about ten years ago went to Mexico with Col. Joe Hampson and has been with him ever since. Mrs. Lee was a daughter of Col. Geo. Wythe Baylor, who moved to this city with his family in 1878. At the time of her death Mrs. Lee was thirty-seven years old. She was born in Galveston, Texas.

DEATH OF MRS. LEE.

The sad news reached here Monday afternoon that Mrs. S. M. Lee had died in Monterey.

She left here two months ago in comparatively good health, in company with her father-in-law, B. Lee, of Chicago. Soon after her arrival in Monterey where her husband is located in business, Mrs. Lee began to fail; she suffered from one complaint after another until finally dropsy set in, and she died of heart failure.

Her mother, Mrs. G. W. Baylor, was with her when she died, as was also her husband, S. M. Lee, and her two boys, Harper and Frank.

Mrs. Lee came first to Guadalajara about eight years ago, where she came as a bride; since then she has been away part of the time, but she had made many warm friends here who are grieved to hear of her death.

The remains were interred in the American cemetery in Monterey where the beautiful burial service of the Episcopal church was said in the presence of many friends and mourners.

Mrs. Lee's girlhood was passed principally in El Paso, and there are many friends in the old home place who will receive the sad message with aching hearts.

Mrs. Lee was, when little more than a child, confirmed in the Episcopal church by Bishop Elliott at El Paso, being the first person ever confirmed in that church, at a time when it was a little tent mission and the howl of the wolves was heard intermingled with the voice of the man of God.

More recently she was connected with the Union Evangelical church of Guadalajara.

The entertainment committee of the American association, as a token of regret at the death of Mrs. Lee and in sympathy with the family, decided to postpone the "Tennyson Evening."
