

GEORGE LOOK, PIONEER, DIES

Succumbs To Heart Failure While Planning Repairs To Property.

Funeral arrangements for George F. Look, 66 years of age, who died Sunday afternoon from heart failure, while planning some repairs on his property in the 400 block on San Jacinto street, have not yet been completed.

Mr. Look was one of El Paso's oldest pioneers. He came to this city 38 years ago on a stage coach from Albuquerque, N. M., as there was no railroad running to El Paso in those days. Shortly after arriving here Mr. Look became proprietor of the Gem saloon, which then stood at the corner of South El Paso street and West Overland. The Gem burned in 1893 and was moved to its present location, and the Fisher hotel was built by Mr. Look on the site where the saloon had been.

Look was an alderman in the Hammett and Charles Davis, sr., administrations and prominent in El Paso politics until the year 1907. He owned a great amount of real estate in South El Paso and several business blocks, also a large ranch in Mexico.

Mr. Look was a member of the Sons of American Revolution and the Pioneers association, also one of the three remaining charter members of the localerie of Eagles, and was the first president of the order when it was organized in El Paso in 1900.

Deceased is survived by his widow, a daughter, Mrs. R. A. Lowenfeld, Robinson apartments, and three sons, Park, George and G. Paul, who have been in Chicago for the past few months with their mother, who has been ill in a hospital there.

Word was received Monday morning from Mrs. Look that she would arrive in El Paso Wednesday night with her three sons. Funeral arrangements will then be completed.
