TIMOTHY LYONS RITES ARRANGED

First El Paso Police Chief Will Be Buried in City; Died in Arizona

Rosary services for Timothy C. Lyons, El Paso's first police chief, who died yesterday at the home of his son in Ajo, Ariz., will be held at 8:30 p. m. today in the home of his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Frank Lyons, 2731 San Diego St. He was 78.

Funeral services will be held in the Immaculate Conception Church at 10 a.m. tomorrow and burial will be in the family plot in Concordia.

Mr. Lyons came to El Paso in 1882. He was married to Miss Nellie Caples in 1886, and in 1890 became police chief. He held this office four years.

Later he founded the Lyon Transfer and Trucking Co., and owned Hotel Lindell. Mr. Lyons was a charter member of the local Knights of Columbus.

He had lived in Ajo for the last eight years.
