Frank Manigold Dies at 70

Frank E. Manigold of 7820 West Drive died yesterday at Fort Bayard, N. M. He was 70.

Mr. Manigold was the first conductor on the interurban railroad that ran between El Paso and Ysleta.

He was a member of El Paso's widely-known Company K of the 4th Texas Infantry which was called out in 1916 to patrol the border below Alpine following Pancho Villa's raid on Columbus, N. M. He later saw action in the Meuse and Argonne Forest battles of Word War I, and was a member of the Lost Battalion of the Argonne.

After World War I he was in the contracting business in the East until ill health forced his retirement. He then returned to El Paso to reside with his brother, Jesse E. Manigold, Probation Department officer.

In addition to his brother, Mr.

Manigold is survived by a sister, Mrs. Edith Corbett of Watertown, N. Y.

Funeral service will be held in the Fort Bayard chapel at 2 p. m. Monday, Burial will be in the Fort Bayard National Cemetery.
