

Heart Attack Fells Hugh McMillan

Hugh McMillan, prominent highway contractor, quarry owner and rancher, died last night while en route from the Hueco Mountains area to his home at 2500 Hawley circle. He was 66.

He and a friend, J. D. Stewart, had gone to the Huecos to inspect a road maintenance project. While there Mr. McMillan decided to drive one of his jeeps back to El Paso. He was driving the jeep, with Mr. Stewart following, when he suffered an apparent heart attack.

MR. McMILLAN pulled over to the roadside and got into the Stewart car. They stopped at a service station on Montana avenue and summoned an ambulance. Mr. McMillan was dead on arrival at Hotel Dieu.

A native of Wealder, Texas, Mr. McMillan had resided in El Paso for some 35 years. He was president and owner of Hugh McMillan Inc., McMillan Quarry Inc., General Redi-Mix Inc., and the Lake Valley Cattle Co. of Hillsboro, N.M.

In his early days here he was associated with Contractor Jack Vowell.
