

James G. McNary, former president of the First National Bank in El Paso and a well-known civic leader, died yesterday in Santa Barbara, Calif., where he had lived the past two years. He was 84.

Mr. McNary had been a newspaperman and banker in New Mexico before he came to El Paso in 1906 as an assistant cashier at the First National Bank. In 1916, he became president of the organization. His first wife was Ruth Reynolds, daughter of the late Joshua Reynolds, also a banker.

In 1925 he retired as president of the bank and moved to Arizona and west into the lumber business. He was president of South-west Lumber Mills, Inc. of Arizona. From 1937 to 1939 he served as president of the National Lumbermen's Assn.

During World War I, Mr. McNary served in France as an emissary of the YMCA. He is the author of a book, "This is My Life," published by the University Press in Albuquerque. The manuscript which now hangs in the airport were printed at his request for the First National Bank.
