

## **MAJ. G. W. MOSSMAN DIES AT ORLANDO, FLA.**

**Was For Years a Prominent Citizen of  
the Upper Valley and Widely  
Known in the Southwest.**

Anthony, N. M., Nov. 12.—Telegraphic advice has been received from Orlando, Fla., saying that G. W. Mossman died at that place Monday morning at 4 o'clock. Maj. Mossman was one of the oldest settlers here. He came into this valley in 1879 and resided here until 1910, when he went to Florida with his son-in-law, C. M. Bruce.

Maj. Mossman was 76 years of age and died from a complication of diseases, contracted during the war of the rebellion, in which he took a prominent part. He enlisted in the 36th Illinois as a private and rose by unaided effort to the rank of major in the three years that he served his country. He was the father of Burton C. Mossman, former and first captain of the Arizona rangers and now a prosperous cattleman of North Dakota. Besides Burton, there are three other sons: W. D. and T. O., both engineers and the Santa Fe, and Walter C., stockman at Mesquite, this county, and two daughters, Mrs. Fred Hanna, of San Marcial, N. M., and Eva Mossman Bruce, his eldest daughter, with whom he was living when he died. Besides these, there are 11 grandchildren. Mrs. Mossman died at Vado several years ago.

Maj. Mossman served one term as commissioner of Dona Ana county.
