

Rites Arranged For C. W. Mottinger

Funeral services for C. W. Mottinger, El Paso insurance man, educator and outstanding civic leader, will be held at 2 p. m. Monday in the Kaster and Maxon Chapel.

The Rev. C. Raymond Gray and Rev. H. L. McAlester will officiate. Burial will be in Restlawn Cemetery.

Mr. Mottinger died yesterday in a hospital after a long illness. He was 77.

Mr. Mottinger was a native of Gentry County, Mo. He was a graduate of State Normal School at Peru, Neb., obtained a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Nebraska, and his master's degree from Denver University.

He came to El Paso in 1921 and was made dean of the El Paso Junior College and assistant principal of El Paso High School. Before that he had been superintendent of schools at Merna, Neb., principal of University Heights High School at Lincoln, Neb., principal of

the Lamar, Colo., high school, principal of the Roswell, N. M., high school, and dean of the Las Vegas, N. M., normal school.

Served on Church Board

After 20 years as an educator he retired to enter the insurance business with the Pacific Mutual Life Insurance Co.

Mr. Mottinger was superintendent of the First Methodist Church School for two decades and was also chairman of the church board. He was active in Boy Scout work and was on the Yucca Scout Council for 25 years. He was awarded the Silver Beaver in 1937.

For many years Mr. Mottinger was active in welfare work and was chairman of the Child Welfare Division of the Central Council of Social Agencies. He was a member of the City-County Child Welfare Board from its inception and was chairman from 1942 to 1947.

Organized Health Group

He was active in the Community Chest, Red Cross and YMCA campaigns. He was an honorary life member of the McCall Nursery Home.

He was a charter member of the Civitan Club, later the Optimist Club.

Mr. Mottinger headed a committee that organized the U. S.-Mexico Border Public Health Assn. Conference. During World War II he was secretary to the El Paso Gideon Camp.

He is survived by his widow, the former Miss Alvina Hunefield; two sons, William M. of El Paso and Vernon R. of Baldwin Park, Calif.; a daughter, Mrs. W. G. Wellington of Los Angeles, a sister, Mrs. Doris Spencer of Broken Bow, Neb.; and six grandchildren.
