Former Banker, Insurance Official, Came To El Paso In 1886.

Max Moye, 51, prominent El Paso banker and insurance man until he was forced by ill health to retire from business five years ago, died at the family residence, 1431 Hawthorne Place, at 2 p. m. yesterday. Mr. Moye was born at San Antonio, Texas, Sept. 6, 1882. He moved to El Paso with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Moye, in 1886, and made his home here until his death.

After completing his education here and in San Antonio, Mr. Moye became interested in hanking and was named vice-president of the Union Bank and Trust company.
