BODY OF MRS. PATTERSON NOW RESTS IN THE GRAVE

Funeral Services Held at Trinity M e t h o d i s t Church Yesterday.

The funeral services of Mrs. Lydia Patterson at Trinity Methodist church yesterday afternoon were attended by hundreds of the friends of the deceased. The hymn, "I Need Thee Every Hour" was rendered with sympathetic effect by a splendid choir. Rev. H. B. Robeson, pastor of the First Christian church, read from St. Matthew Christ's words to his disciples: "Let not your heart be troubled; ye believe in God, believe also in me." At the conclusion of the prayer following the reading the choir sang, "Asleep in Jesus."
