

#### Mr. Pomeroy's Death.

W. S. Pomeroy one of the best known citizens in this part of the union died at 7 a. m. today at his north Oregon street residence, surrounded by his sorrowing family. The body was removed to Emerson & Berrein's morgue where an autopsy was held under Dr. Vilas' directions. The funeral will be held at 4 p. m. tomorrow from St. Clements church under the auspices of the G. A. R. of which the deceased was an honored member. The members of the Post are requested to meet in their hall at 3:30 p. m. whence they will march in a body to the church.

Mr. Pomeroy's death was almost a foregone conclusion a week ago when fatal illness seized him, but it is nevertheless a shock to his many friends and acquaintances who had hoped he might live many years yet, and the attendance at the funeral is likely to be more than the little church can accommodate.

S. W. Pomeroy was born at Windsor, Vermont, served in the civil war as a private, being a member of the 3rd Vermont battery. After the war he moved to Clifton, Arizona, where he was made justice of the peace and where he made a very good record. He also established a stage line between Clifton and Lordsburg. In 1882 he served as a Graham county supervisor, and was afterwards elected county treasurer. In 1885 Mr. Pomeroy moved to Solomonville where he ranched it for some time. He was elected to the Arizona legislature in 1887, but did not serve owing to his change of residence to this city, where he has been a useful citizen. In 1887 Mr. Pomeroy purchased an interest in the El Paso Transfer Company which concern he has managed successfully, as the new building on South Oregon street will testify.

A widow and two children—Mrs. Will Rand and a son, Charles—survive his death. Mr. Pomeroy's age was 47, and was but lately installed as commander of Emmet Crawford Post No. 19 G. A. R.
