## ROBERTS' BODY

Funeral of Pioneer Cattleman and Local Capitalist Thursday at 3.

Funeral services for Martin D. (Uncle Dick) Roberts, southwestern pioneer, who died Sunday morning in a sanatorium at Long Beach, Cal., in his 70th year, of pneumoria, following a brief illnens, will be held at Trinity Methodist church Thursday afternoon at 3 oclock. The body will reach here from the cdast Wednesday. It is likely that El Paso lodge, No. 130, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, will conduet a ritualistic service at the grave. Rev. Percy R. of Trinity Methodist church, where Mr. Roberts worshipped, will have charge of the religious service. The pallbearers will be judge Peyton F. Edwards, U. S. Stewart, W. H. Austin, W. R. Piper! John M. Whatt, W. T. Hixson and Alfred P. Coles.

Mr. Roberts had been at Los Angeles and Long Beach for two months. He was attacked by a sort of paralysis early last week, according to a letter from George W. Nowell, an El Pasoan at Long Beach, and taken to the Sanatorium. Pheumonia followed. Mr. Roberts and his nephew, both unmarried lived at 1001 Mesa avenue, when in El Paso.

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Mr. Roberts's father moved his family overland from Surry, county, North Carolina, when deceased was a child, to Fort Worth, and Martin grow up there to young manhood. He lived for 10 or 12 years at Abilene, Texas, while engaged in cattle business. Later he moved to Grant dounty, New Mexico, settling on a ranch north of the Southern Pacific railroad, with Separ as his nearest postoffico, Formany years he ran cattle on a wide range between Lordsburg and Deming.

Closing out his livestock, he came to El Paso and, with his nephew, built the Roberts-Banner building, at the corner of Mesa and Mills, in 1911, this being one of the first tall structuring to be raised around San Jacinto plant Last year Eboerts and Banner built the Martin building, at Mills and Stanton. Besides these they owned the Rio Grande, and their home. Their investments in El Paso realty have an approximate value of \$675,000, it was said Mondal.

Mr. Roberte's nearest relatives are two sisters, Mrs. Walter Scott and Mrs. Tine, living at Fort Worth, and one Srother, Tom W. Roberts, Wichita Falls, Texas. Deceased was born at Mount Airy, North Carolina, Feb. 20, 1848.
