

## O. G. SEETON DEAD; PIONEER EL PASOAN

**Was Long Prominent in Business Here  
and Leaves Large Estate; Owned  
Much El Paso Property.**

O. G. Seeton, one of the wealthiest and most prominent of El Paso's pioneers, died at his home in Los Angeles, Cal., Monday, afternoon at the age of 58 years. He is survived by his wife and one son, Bruce, who were with him at the time of his death, and a brother, who resides in Keota, Iowa.

In 1880 he married Miss Mollie Coffin at Albuquerque, N. M., where for some time he was engaged in the lumber business. In 1882 he moved to El Paso and with C. O. Coffin established a grain and feed and seed business under the name of Coffin and Seeton, continuing until 1894, when he bought out C. O. Coffin and Frank B. Coffin, his brother-in-law, who is now connected with the Alhambra dairy in this city, was admitted to partnership and continued with him until 1906, when Coffin retired and his son, Bruce Seeton, was admitted to partnership.

About five years ago the elder Mr. Seeton moved to California for the benefit of his health, leaving the business in the hands of his son, who disposed of it in the spring of 1911 and moved to California to join his father.

O. G. Seeton was estimated to be worth close to \$200,000 at the time of his death, among his holdings being El Paso real estate valued at more than \$100,000. For many years he made his home in the handsome residence he built at the corner of Ochoa street and Magoffin avenue.
