

Rites Arranged For Dr. Terrell

Was Decorated In First World War

Funeral services for Dr. Scurry Lattimer Terrell will be held at 4:30 p.m. today in Barry Hagedon Chapel with Rev. DuBose Murphy officiating. Burial will be in Restlawn.

Dr. Terrell died yesterday in his home at 2600 Richmond street. He was 71 and had been a resident of El Paso since 1917, when he returned from overseas service, after the first World War.

He was awarded a decoration for distinguished service with the English army before the United States entered the War.

With America in the war, he joined the Army Medical Corps and served at a base hospital at Ypres.

He held the commission of Colonel in the Medical Reserves.

Born in Houston

Dr. Terrell was born in Houston. His father was Edward Ruthven Terrell, after whom Terrell was named. Richard Scurry, his maternal grandfather, fought in the Battle of San Jacinto and was one of the first justices of the Supreme Court of the Republic of Texas.

He was personal physician of Theodore Roosevelt during the 1912 campaign.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mary Sedly Terrell; a son, Frank Ewing Terrell, Camp Barkley, Texas; two daughters, Mrs. Margaret Terrell Luther and Mrs. Shirley Terrell Leavell both of El Paso; four grandsons, Oliver P. Luther Jr., Frank C. Luther, Charles Scurry Leavell and James L. Terrell, and one granddaughter, Mary E. Leavell.
