

RANDOLPH TERRY DIED SATURDAY

**WELL KNOWN ATTORNEY EXPIRED SUD-
DENLY—WENT TO OFFICE AS
USUAL IN MORNING.**

**He Was Raised in El Paso and Attended
Local Schools—Graduated From
University in 1902.**

Randolph Terry, a well known member of the El Paso Bar association, an active member of the Masonic, Old Fellows and Elks lodges, and one of the recognized members of the El Paso Country club and its attendant activities, died suddenly yesterday morning at a local hospital. Death came as attendants of the hospital and ambulance lifted the lawyer from his stretcher. His wife was present when he passed away.

Mr. Terry has been ill for the past several months. However, he was in the best of spirits and apparently as well as usual when friends bid him good night Friday night at 8 o'clock. He arose yesterday morning, and, following his custom of the past, went to his law office about 9:30 o'clock. At 10 o'clock he was attacked, and his wife was called. A few moments later

an ambulance was called, and rushed the dying man to a local hospital, where he died. Death was due, apparently to heart failure.

Randolph Terry had lived in El Paso 29 years, and was 36 years old. He came here with his parents from Hamilton county, Texas, and while a boy worked for the Morning Times. He went to the local grammar and high schools, from which he graduated, and then received his degree in law at the University of Texas in 1902. He then returned to El Paso, where he entered the law business. For a time he was a partner with Volney Brown, but for the past three years he has been practicing alone. He was justice of the peace in El Paso in 1907.

He was married in Los Angeles in 1906. His wife, who was with him at the time of death yesterday, and three children are his closest survivors. His mother, Mrs. E. J. Terry, three sisters, Mrs. W. E. Fletcher, Mrs. L. A. Spencer and Mrs. C. E. Patterson, also live in El Paso.

Funeral arrangements had not been completed last night. Word from relatives, especially the mother of Mrs. Terry in Los Angeles, is awaited prior to final arrangements. It is probable that burial will be had either Monday or Tuesday.
