

MRS. L. L. TRIGG, PIONEER, DIES

Daughter of Prominent Confederate; Descendant of Revolutionary Man.

Funeral services for Mrs. Laura Livingston Trigg, 415 Myrtle avenue, will be held this afternoon from the Peak undertaking chapel. Rev. J. F. Williams, First Baptist church, will officiate.

Mrs. Trigg died at her residence Friday. She was born in Columbia, S. C., November 13, 1829, the daughter of John Livingston, one of the prominent men in the Confederacy. Decedent was a direct lineal descendent of Phil Livingston, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence. She had lived in El Paso for the past ten years and has been an active member of the Daughters of the Confederacy. She was an honorary member of the state organization.

C. L. Trigg, a son, of Denton, Texas, and a daughter, Mrs. E. F. Croom, are the only surviving relatives.

Married in 1849.

Mrs. Trigg was married to Abraham Saunders Trigg at Marian, Ala., December 13, 1849. A few years later they moved to Alta Springs, Texas, where they resided until they moved to El Paso. Mr. Trigg died several years ago.
