

DEATHS AND FUNERALS.

Eugene A. Warner.

At 6 o'clock last evening Eugene A. Warner of San Elizario, died at Hotel Dieu, after an illness of five months from complicated kidney trouble caused by an injury received at Raton pass, N. M., twenty-seven years ago.

Deceased was born at Ann Arbor, Washtenow county, Michigan, December 4, 1848. He lived there until the age of nineteen, when he came west and choosing the profession of civil engineer began his career as a stake-man with an engineering party in the early location of the Santa Fe, under W. R. Morley. In those days, as since, he was a warm friend of Captain Jas. H. White and T. J. Woodside.

After the completion of the Santa Fe he left Las Vegas overland for Guaymas with the corps of engineers and contractors known as the "Pioneers of the Sonora Railroad." This party also contained W. R. Morley, T. J. Woodside and Henry and Tom Detwiler.

He was locating engineer of the Sonora railroad, but soon resigned to take contract work, later following the same work of grading construction on the Mexican Central railroad, also doing some locating for that road. Later, among other things, he had sole charge of the surveys of all the Mexican government lands.

Since that time he has held various offices in the engineering corps of the Mexican Central railroad until a little over two years ago, when he came to live at his ranch at San Elizario in this county.

He leaves a widow and four sisters, two of whom, Mrs. T. Standfield, and Mrs. J. J. Schauer, live at San Elizario. He was an uncle of J. C. Critchett and O. A. Critchett and Mrs. J. W. Eubank, of this city. He was a man of great energy and was kind, generous to a fault and his patience in times of trouble, as was demonstrated throughout his illness, was peerless.

The funeral will be held this afternoon at three o'clock from the house of J. W. Eubank, 905 Wyoming street.
