Judge Weeks Dies At Home

Heart Disease Is Fatal to
Veteran El Paso
Attorney.

Judge John Franklin Weeks, 65, veteran El Paso attorney, and a former district judge, died yesterday morning at his residence, 1022 East Nevada street, of heart disease after four days' illness.

Judge Weeks suffered a stroke of paralysis in May, 1930, while temporarily making his home at Odessa, Texas. The attack left his system weakened, and he was unable to rally after being stricken last Wednesday.

The veteran barrister had practiced law in El Paso for the last 20 years, with the exception of three years he spent at Odessa. He came here from Palestine, Texas, where he also was engaged in practicing law. At one time he was district judge of Anderson county. He was born at Franklin, La.

Funeral Tomorrow.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a. m. tomorrow at Peak-Hagedorn chapel. Burial will be in Evergreen cemetery.

Active pallbearers will be George Roberts, Sam West, C. W. Croom, Del Harrington, John Hill, and Tom Armstrong. Honorary pallbearers will be Tom Lea, Congressman R. E. Thomason, W. H. Pelphrey, E. F. Higgins, W. H. Burges, and W. D. Howe.

Judge Weeks is survived by his widow; three daughters, Mrs. A. W. Andrews, Walhallo, N. D.; Mrs. W. H. F. Judd, and Miss Mary Weeks, of El Paso; a granddaughter, Mary Ann Judd, and a grandson, John Weeks Andrews.
