

# Tributes Paid To Memory Of Mrs. Sarah E. Wooten

Mrs. Henry A. Cline of Wharton, Texas, who was called here on account of the death of her mother, Mrs. Sarah Elizabeth Wooten, will remain several days longer with her sister, Mrs. Frances Wooten Aldridge, before returning home.

Mrs. Wooten's funeral was held in the Harford chapel and the gray-silver trimmed casket, across which a wide shaft of sunlight glowed from a west window, was covered with pink roses, carnations and other flowers of the springtime combined with lavender and silver ribbons sent by her daughters, grandsons, granddaughters and great grand children.

The Rev. Clarence H. Horner, rector of the Church of St. Clement, read the funeral service at the chapel and the service at the grave in Evergreen cemetery. The casket was borne by a group of long-time friends.

Both young and old were at the services, many of them having been helped in their careers by Mrs.

Wooten during the long unselfish years of her useful life.

## ***Pioneer's Will Is Written On Brown Wrapping Paper***

Scrawled on a piece of brown wrapping paper five days before her death, the will of Mrs. Sarah E. Wooten, pioneer El Pasoan, set out it was her desire that her \$10,000 estate be divided among her two daughters, Elizabeth Wooten Cline and Francis Wooten Aldridge, and her granddaughter, Sadie Ruth A. Scott.

Two lots Mrs. Wooten owned in Military Heights addition were left to her namesake, Betty Scott, according to the will.

Mrs. Wooten's will was filed for probate yesterday. She requested that the three principals in the will administer the estate. The will was made March 23 and Mrs. Wooten died here March 28.
