It was the aggrieved newspaper man's turn now, and he sat down on a rescued bed and enjoyed a grand haw-haw over Jones' impromptu gymnastic exhibition.

A puff of suffocating smoke; a burst of flame! This is what Lessee H.T. Bosonge, of the old Grand Central block, caught in the face at 11 oclock a.m. today as he passed by a closet at the head of the front stairway. Some criminally careless person had thrown the lighted stump of a cigarette in there is nothing else that mortally sure, as there is nothing else that could have started the fire. The flames spread with marvelous rapidity, aided by the brisk breeze bowing at the time, and shortly the increasing draft sent the flames and blinding, stifling smoke flying in all directions, as the entire property is an old tinder box, and once started it burned like punk. There were 75 families, mostly Mexicans, in the building, besides the ground floor business tenants. These 200 people were all rushing, tearing, pulling, hauling to save their little all, and half dressed women, women with babies, women with arms full of anything they could grab up and run with, were running in and out, assisted by their men folks and the crowd that came rushing in from the plaza. Of the ground floor tenants lawyers Townsend and Shackleford got out with their books and fixtures; Teran, the Mexican tailor got out all his plant; Otis ticker, the ticker broker, rescued all his property; I. Ladish, the gunsmith, lost \$100 worth; M.J. Lemon, the photographer, lost a \$500 uninsured outfit and like to have got burned up himself in attempting to save his property. building destroyed was historic and the last monument connecting new El Paso with Spanish ownership. It was built about the year 1827 by Juan Ponce de Leon and used by him as a hotel by Mrs. Roneau, and was a popular hostelry for the overland stage route until the advent of the railroads in 1881, at

which time the redwood top story was added and the late John Dougher became proprietor. In '83 upon the building of the new hotel, the old building became a tenant house, and as such has been a constant menace to surrounding buildings. The opinion was expressed that the building stood on ground that was properly a part of the little plaza, and that now would be a good time for the city to press suit to obtain its own. The Center block is damaged about \$500 and the hotel furnishings, owned by George Newell, some \$500 more. **C.F.**Jones was another unfortunate who lost all he had.
