Work Starts on New Wing Of Ranchland School

Ranchland Hills Elementary School, newest addition to the rapidly expanding Ysleta Independent School District, will open for its first term Sept. 7.

But already the eight-classroom building has been "out-grown" and work has begun on adding a second wing.

Only the first five grades can be accommodated in the present wing, a steel-frame structure which embodies the principle of a more compact school plant.

Ready in December

The second wing, which will be similar to the present building, is expected to be completed by late December and will be ready for occupancy at mid-term, according to J. M. Hanks, superintendent of the Ysleta Independent School District.

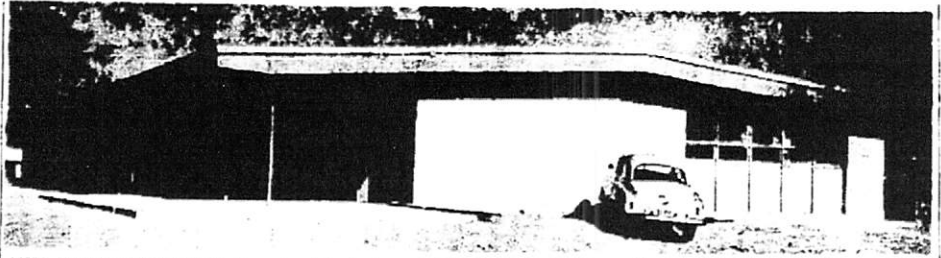
Total cost for the two wings will be nearly \$250,000. The school is located on Yuma and Cuba drives

in Ranchland Hills, one of the area's newest subdivisions developed by DeWitt and Rearick, realtors.

When the newest wing is completed, it will be joined to the present structure by an enclosed corridor. The wings will run parallel to each other. They will face east and west so that window areas will face north and south to take full advantage of natural light.

All Purpose Auditorium

The present wing contains eight classrooms, library, visual aid room and an administrative setup. At present, however, the library

and visual aid room are being made into a temporary cafeteria. It will be open on the first day of school Sept. 7.

The new wing will have an all-purpose cafeteria-auditorium. In addition it will contain eight classrooms, teachers' lounge, restrooms, bookroom and storeroom.

Ray Ward and Son are the contractors for the new wing. The present wing was built by J. E. Morgan and Sons.

Ysleta Names New Principal

General meeting of more than
800 teachers in the Ysleta Inde-
pendent School District will be
held at 9:30 a. m. tomorrow as
the school system prepares for
its largest enrollment in history.

Superintendent J. M. Hanks
said indications are that peak
enrollment will exceed 23,000, an
increase of more than 2500 over
last year.

Mr. Hanks also announced the
appointment of Warren Carter as
principal of Ranchland Hills Ele-
mentary School, succeeding D. D.
Boney who has joined a school
system near his home in Dallas
County.

Mr. Carter, who has been in
the Ysleta system for seven
years and assistant principal at
Ranchland for two years, was
graduated from Texas Western
College with a bachelor's degree
and later received his master's
degree in education at the local
college. A native of Blue Moun-
tain, Miss., he is married and
the father of two sons: Charles 9
and Barry 5. The family attends
First Christian Church and lives
at 7819 Dogwood street.
