SAM. W. HOOD, EL PASOAN FOR 15 YEARS, DIES

Funeral services for Samuel Weir Hood, 84 years old, a retired rancher, who died at 4 p. m. Saturday, will be held from the family residence, 3514 Douglas street at 3 oclock tomorrow afternoon.

Mr. Hood is survived by his widow, five daughters and two sons. The daughters are Mrs. H. L. Holder, 3722 Morenci street; Mrs. J. P. Robertson, 3514 Douglas street; Mrs. L. B. Smith, 2311 Alameda avenue; Mrs. G. B. Whitmore of Bakersfield and Mrs. C. D. Moore of Los Angeles. The sons are Samuel Hood of Ft. Worth, and Albert Hood of Hermleigh, Texas.

Mr. Hood resided in El Paso for 15 years. He was a civil war veteran and member of Robert E. Lee chapter, United Confederate Veterans. He was born in Nashville, Tenn.
